


From the Principal's Desk:

December is the month for giving and receiving gifts. We are so blessed at Pettigrew that the families at Pettigrew give us the opportunity to work alongside with them, to improve the future of our students in the area of academics, as well as their emotional growth, social skills implementation and physical well-being. Our Pettigrew mission statement talks directly about this focus, as it says, "To educate and prepare each student to succeed in a changing world by emphasizing growth in social skills, emotional well-being, and academic progress." We are very blessed to have the family support that we enjoy, and when we all understand that we

have the same goals and aspirations for our students, we might sometimes differ on our ideas for the daily implementation of these goals. We can discuss these differences and sometimes agree to disagree, as we keep the focus on our mission, purpose and interest for all students in our learning community at Pettigrew.

In the interest of sharing some gifts, I would like to share some additional at-home reading strategies that families can do to improve their students learning in this area. As December may allow us some additional time at home to spend with our children, I hope that some of these suggestions can be helpful to you and will also prove helpful to us, as we work within this short month of classroom hours with our students to address reading improvement, and as we also measure it at the interim session with our MAP testing, coming in the next two weeks.

When reading.....

Spot the details: Nonfiction books have the answers to many questions children may ask, if your children read carefully, they will find them.

Read around the text: The pages of many nonfiction books are covered with extras that stories don't have (headings, photo captions, an index, a glossary). Point out these features. Then, ask your youngsters what questions they have about the topics that the book might answer. Say they are reading, "Archaeologists Dig for Clues" by Kate Duke, they might think, "What tools do archaeologists use?" or "What are fossils?" Help them read the book and see how many answers they can find.

Pair fiction and nonfiction: Together, read a story like, "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" by James Marshall, followed by a nonfiction book such as "Bears" by Deborah Hodge. As you read the second book, encourage your child to look for ways that real bears are different from the fictional ones. For example, they might say real bears eat things like grass, berries, fish and insects, while the three bears eat porridge.

Have fun with words:

- 1. Choose a three-letter word, such as cap. Have your youngsters substitute different beginning sounds from the alphabet to make new words (lap, map, nap, rap, sap, tap, zap). How many can they think of?
- 2. Pick a long word and tell them to clap once as she says each syllable. For mozzarella, they would clap four times: moz-za-rel-la.

- 3. Ask your child to say a word without the first sound. Example: "Can you say 'sit' without the s? (it).
- 4. Think of a word and give your youngsters a sound clue to figure it out. For instance, I am thinking of a word for something that you chew but don't swallow, the word has an 'uh' sound in it. (gum).

Vocabulary Boosters: A large vocabulary can turn your children into a better reader and writer. Try these everyday ways to help them learn new words.

- 1. **Keep your ears open.** When you have your youngsters go places, point out words that people use. Maybe a waiter describes an entrée or the dentist talks about molars. Encourage your children to figure out what the words mean by the way they are used.
- 2. **Go beyond nouns**. Help your youngsters add adjectives and verbs to their vocabulary. Sports and games offer opportunities to use action words. Let you children hear you comment on the softball that soars or the runner who sprints. When they send thank you notes or greeting cards, suggest descriptive words such as a polka-dotted shirt or a fantastic birthday.

Journal writing traditions can be important. If your children see you writing in a journal, they may ask what you are doing. Explain why you are writing in a journal, when you started, and ask if they would want to write in a journal, too. If they do, give them a notebook. When considering what they should write about, explain to them that a journal can be a place to store their memories, but they can also do things like drawing pictures or writing stories. You can even decide to sketch yourself as the parent and the student, writing together in your journals. Then you can take turns writing sentences about this picture. Have your children write in their journals and encourage them to share selections from their journals with you and with others, possibly in the family.

A quick reminder about our December events we will have at Pettigrew on December 20. An Invitation to Engage

Long-time District employees call it one of the most significant undertakings in the history of their work in education. I anticipate it will be just that. Redrawing school attendance boundaries is a monumental task that affects the lives of thousands of children, their parents, and our community, in general. It was more than 25 years ago that the last significant boundary change was implemented in Sioux Falls with the opening of Roosevelt High School.

In January, the Sioux Falls School District begins a six-month-long process as a result of the successful \$190 Million bond that approved the construction of Ben Reifel Middle School and Thomas Jefferson High School. Overcrowding due to growth on the west side of Sioux Falls drove the need for those new facilities and new boundaries are necessary to ensure overall efficiency and diversity of each school building.

A 30-member task force has been selected to gather information and make recommendations. They will do their work in three public meetings in January and February and make recommendations that will then be taken to the broader community for input during the months of March and April. Public meetings are scheduled at each of the five middle schools. School leaders will present the recommendations and listen to feedback. All reasonable input that is in line with the priorities approved by the School Board will be considered. Those priorities include:

- Priority 1: Quality Education for All Students
- Priority 2: Student safety/Well-Being
- Priority 3: Budget Considerations
- Priority 4: Natural Borders as School Boundary Lines
- Priority 5: Accommodate Growth and Change

The final plan will be voted upon by the school board in June 2020 but will not go into effect until the new schools open in the Fall of 2021. I assure you there is no preconceived plan already drawn up and hiding in a backroom. I firmly believe, and the District has demonstrated through its process to develop the plan for the bond, that community input makes good plans even better.

As your superintendent, I look forward to participating in good and thoughtful dialogue to move our school district forward. I fully expect it will be an emotional issue. The good news is that all our schools are well-maintained and welcoming places to learn. Sioux Falls has much to be proud of and I know the outcome of this difficult work will only make our schools and our community stronger.
