From the Principal's Desk: Mr. Kevin Dick



As the fourth quarter of the school year began just last week, several events that traditionally mark the beginning of spring and the ending of the school year are again looming in the very near future. Although this school year has been unlike any other that we have seen, there are some familiar tasks that we are once again commencing and will be completed before the school year closes. Some of these tasks were not able to be completed in a remote format last year at this time, so it seems that they have been held in our distant memories from years ago, but indeed, they are efforts that press upon us and

must be attended to for the school year to properly give way to summer and once again a new year.

One such task is Kindergarten Registration for the coming school year. Until the very day of this writing, it appeared that we would be doing this task in a remote fashion, since parents are not allowed into the school building this year, to protect the health and safety of our students and to allow us to keep our doors open to students as we conclude the academic year in person. See this link for a video that was made, with others planned for production, to account for this event that was traditionally held and was thought to be impossible this year. Just today, it will be announced that a face-to-face event will be held for the parents of our new kindergarten students and allow them to come into the school on Thursday afternoon and early evening, April 22, 2021. Another set of events that began this week and will continue until the end of the school year is gathering of data regarding the achievement of students in the area of academics. We have begun our regular battery of state-required standardized testing in 5th grade this year and it will gradually roll out in the next few weeks, to fourth grade and then to third. Parents will be notified of the weeks of these tests, but should be aware that the format this year is in a much more spread-out and even pace, rather than waiting for the end of the year and cramming them all into a short span of time. This data is important for us to collect, this year especially, as we measure the impact remote education had on our students' knowledge base that we could not gather last year due to the remote setting. Also, we want to compare our levels of achievement this year to those in the past and see how our work has progressed toward making up the gap caused by remote learning last year. At the end of the year, we will once again have the third installment of our triannual MAP testing that all students in K-5 take, in order to measure progress over time.

Besides the data that is collected from these standardized and regularly occurring assessments, our teachers working in collaborative teams, have been collecting data about the achievement progress made by our students in the area of literacy and reading as well as in math instruction and math intervention. We also look at the social and emotional health of our students and this year, are looking at the impact that the pandemic has had on those areas of our students. All this data rolls up into the efforts of assessing the levels of success our school was able to meet, and we examine this for two reasons. One is to assess our progress and monitor that as we compare it to historical information about Pettigrew and about the Sioux Falls School District. The other reason is to plan for areas that we can improve on and areas we need to focus on for next year. All of these items are combined into a document that is called a School Improvement Plan and is an annual requirement for schools in Sioux Falls and indeed, around the state and nation. A Guiding Coalition of staff members meet regularly to discuss this data and to articulate and

implement the plan, as stated. This past year, our threefold focus has been on continuing our efforts of literacy instruction and intervention, implementing a new math intervention program, and encouraging the development of social and emotional health of our students and staff by focusing on ways to make our school more responsive and engaging in these important areas. This spring, our group will meet again to conceptualize, plan, and document the areas we will focus on for next year. Stay tuned for more information about these plans that will align to the Strategic Planning that is going on in the district. This strategic work in the district has been and will be involved in a number of staff and community listening sessions, and the information gathered will lead to a Strategic Plan document that will be implemented and referred to for several years to come. Even though some of our community events such as PTO Pizza Bingo Night, Art Show, in-person musical concerts and other social school gatherings have not been able to be held in the school setting, and even though parents have not been able to come into the school, we are hopeful for the future, and envision most of these traditional events returning to our community activity. And while we are not able to gather at these social events, we are still able to perform the academic tasks that traditionally come at the end of the year and have been outlined and explained in this document. We hope you have a nice spring, as the weather turns the corner, and we draw closer summer and the activities.

150 Years: Celebrating Public Education in Sioux Falls

If the Sioux Falls School District was holding a spelling bee in 2021, a good word to stump even a few of our best spellers might be "sesquicentennial." A common practice at spelling bees is for the announcer to say the word, define it, and then use it in a sentence. That sentence might be "The Sioux Falls School District is celebrating its sesquicentennial in the 2021-22 school year."

The Sioux Falls School District was formally established on July 3, 1871. Old records indicate the first school opened in 1870 in the Government Barracks under the direction of teacher Mary A. Benton who trained 17 pupils. However, it was the summer of 1871 when newly elected Minnehaha County Superintendent John Bippus divided the county into seven school districts as one of his first official acts. District #1 was comprised of the entire Sioux Falls township. Still, it took another two years for its first school board to be established with elected members being A. Gale, Director; R.F. Pettigrew, Clerk; and D.S. Goodyear, Treasurer.

It is humbling to think about the exponential value public education has brought to the community through the students who have graduated with a Sioux Falls School District diploma over the past 150 years. We have launched so many successful people who fill every career and job title currently and previously needed and known. We believe this is a feat worth celebrating!

A Planning Committee made up of parents and community members has been meeting since February to determine a fitting theme, and design memorable activities that can be embraced by all stakeholders.

Before school starts again in the fall, we will launch our plan for activities and events to be held throughout the 2021-2022 school year. The theme is "Rooted in Our Past ~ Reaching for Our Future." The committee is hoping to engage with former staff members, alumni, community members, current parents, students, and employees to highlight all we have achieved in the previous 150 years and to establish new and exciting goals to launch us into the next 150 years. If your path took you through SFSD, dig out your old photos and memorabilia. We are setting up a digital time capsule by decade.

The launch of the District 150th Anniversary celebration will also include the unveiling of new strategic priorities to guide our work as we aspire to be the best school district in the nation. This is a lofty goal, but who better to achieve it than a school district that has 150 years of success in its rearview mirror and one that is committed to continuous improvement for the next century and beyond.

Sesquicentennial isn't an easy word to say or to spell. But, paraphrasing the great Theodore Roosevelt, we believe *nothing worth doing comes easy*. We look forward to celebrating this milestone in our history with all of you!
